



Block Schedule Explanation

- The majority of North Carolina Public Schools (not necessarily Public Charter Schools) are on the Block Schedule
- Four courses are taken each semester, Blocks are typically 90 minutes long
- Some schools offer select courses all year on an A Day/B Day schedule. If the school allows, two A Day/B Day classes must be chosen at a time, so one class is on A Day and the other is on B Day.

Example of a Possible 9th Grade Block Schedule

Courses Taken 1st Semester- August to January	Courses Taken 2nd Semester- January to June
1 English I	1 Earth & Environmental Science
2 Math II	2 Elective-Personal Finance
3 Spanish I	3 World History
4 Physical Education/Health	4 Elective-Band I

Con's of Block Schedule

- You could take a Math class or Foreign Language class, the first semester of 9th grade and possibly not take the second class until the 2nd semester of 10th grade. That means the possibility of an entire year without Math or Foreign Language.
- Some schools offer Math & Foreign Language (and other core classes) on A-day/B-day schedules. Check with your school to see if this is available.
- The pace of the courses is much faster. It makes it difficult to miss school because of how much is missed in one day.
- The High School decides which semester each classes are taken, you don't choose the semester.



Pro's of Block Schedule

- Opportunities to accelerate learning in a particular area by taking multiple courses in the same subject in the same year, i.e. doubling up on Math (for example taking High School Math II and High School Math III in the same school year) or doubling up on Science (for example, taking Biology and Chemistry in the same school year to prepare for other Advanced Placement (AP) Science courses).
- Final exams for the first semester are held in January, and after that time the first 4 courses are complete, so you don't have to worry about the first 4 classes (unless you have A/B Day classes).
- You only have 4 courses per semester to keep up with, compared with 7 at Socrates Academy (unless you have A/B Day classes).
